## The Ore Car

The end of the year is upon us faster than I anticipated. Leaves have finally started falling from the trees, cold (?) weather - OK, milder weather - has arrived, and the holiday parties have started. But it has been a good year for the Texas Western. We've been somewhat more than "inching" forward making progress.

Trackwork wise, the last 3 track projects are the MKT Engine Facility, the East Texas Timber Syndicate (ETTS) Sawmill, and Pantke Coke and Chemical. Virtually all other track for Phase 1 has been laid.

The harbor area is coming along well thanks to David.

We've now got all three grain elevators completed by Mike G. and James F. For purposes of "location recognition" in our JMRI operating scheme, the area between the two elevators opposite each other on the north-south tracks – ATSF, MKT, & SP – along the aisle, is dubbed "Elevator Canyon". It certainly reminds *me* of a deep, dark, narrow place with high cliff walls.

And Darrell's work on Tower 55 is fabulous. What a great and iconic scene!

Our efforts at building an operating plan in JMRI have been fruitful. We successfully held 4 operating "sessions" during October and November. Following is a brief review the JMRI operating plan:

- We started with operations centered on the Lone Star Steel mill. There is a LOT of traffic in and out of that facility.
- Raw materials into the plant are broken into pairs of days:
  - Iron ore loads move in on Monday and Thursday afternoons, while limestone empties move out in the mornings to make room for iron ore.
  - Coke loads move in on Tuesday and Friday after the iron ore loads have departed the mill.
  - Limestone loads from Gulf Sand and Gravel go up to the ore bins on Wednesday and Saturday once Coke empties are headed back to Pantke Coke & Chemical.
- Steel products move out on a similar basis, except only three times per week instead of 6. The Lone Star Steel mill ships:

- Various sizes and types of oilfield drill pipe, well casing, pipeline pipe, and semifinished tool joints to handlers and finishers in the Houston area.
- Coiled steel to a automobile frame manufacturer in the Houston area, and to the Arlington GM Plant.
- Crushed Slag to ?? via the Gulf Sand & Gravel site., where it is exchanged for limestone flux for the blast furnace.
- Steel mill supplies and other materials currently go to Frisco's 8<sup>th</sup> Street Yard for distribution to their sources.
- Finally, grain is being exported from the Kimbell, Bailey, and Producers Grain elevators to sites "off layout" in staging.

So far, we've ran one 24 hour "railroad day", a 'Tuesday'.

But being that it's the start of the "Holiday Season" with people making family plans, and because we've found many "issues" with turnouts, track, and track power, I'd like to suspend "operations" until mid January, to allow us to resolve issues, and add additional trains to our operating system. We should be able to restart operations and *have*MORE FUN!
